NOTES from MGC DISTRICT 1 MEETING: MAY 18, 2023

On Thursday, May 18, seven of our GCD members attended the Michigan Garden Clubs District 1 Spring Leadership Meeting in the Southfield Public Library. They were: Christine Berryman, Carol Chrzastek, Laurine Griffin, Linda Johnson, Sherry Kammer, Jo West and Rose Wiggle.

The day began with updates from state and district officers. Here is a summary:

- Meetings should be fun and make an effort to include prospective or new members.

- Share and Grow grants are available from MGC for community projects: see website
- The Black Swallowtail Butterfly is on its way to becoming Michigan's state butterfly when HB4159 and the Senate Bill both pass.
- The MGC has added 3 new clubs

Upcoming Events:

- June 10: District 1 Flower Arranging Guild will host an exhibit and opportunities to speak with designers from 1:00-5:00 p.m. The event will be at a church in Livonia
- October 5-7: An MGC Flower Show School will be held in Ann Arbor. Details available in late June on MGC website.
- October 19: Fall District 1 Leadership Meeting hosted by Taylor Garden Club at the Lakes of Taylor Country Club

Following the officers' reports, there were 2 Break Out Sessions led by 7 discussion facilitators. They focused on "Educating, mentoring and supporting our youth in the areas of gardening and the environment" and "Conservation and the environment".

Our club appears to be doing well in both areas and our representatives shared what we are doing. However, there are some things that other clubs are doing that we may want to consider.

- Buying bulk seeds (Ferndale uses zinnias), put them in envelopes with directions and the club's name on them, and distribute them in the community.
- Ferndale also does a similar thing with daffodil bulbs in perforated paper bags in the fall.
- Use mugs or china cups instead of paper cups at meetings to cut down on paper waste.
- Use Facebook and Instagram to publicize activities. Note: Our club does not have a Facebook page. Is someone interested in setting one up and keeping it updated?
- Offer hands-on activities to pre-schoolers and grade school children and their families to get them "hooked" on gardening at an early age.
- Advertise Smokey Bear and Woodsy Owl Poster Contest in local papers, social media to generate interest. Note: Our contest goes through the Dearborn school system.
- Have a table at a Farmers' Market for kids to plant seeds in paper cups and follow up in a few weeks with a display of what they grew.

The meeting was followed by a lunch and a tour of the nearby Mary Thompson Farmhouse.
