Listing many activities over the past two years including fundraising and the Meadowbrook outing, she emphasized the increased attendees at our Holly Berry Brunch (and the fun putting together the baskets), all we have done for Dearborn schools and the scouts ("children are the future"), our scholarships, and how we build up Dearborn through our philanthropy, dedication, and fun. She reminded us to keep our eyes open for beautiful bargains which will find their way into the Holly Berry Brunch baskets this coming December, too. And speaking of the HBB....returning club member, Marlene Wojtowicz stepped up to host this year's celebration. Following Cynthia's address, the business meeting continued with Treasurer Laurine Griffin's financial report; she cautioned her numbers were not final as our fiscal year ends on June 30. As of June 16, our total balance is \$18,639.75.

Terri Bungee, Vice President of External Affairs, shared news from two of the schools to which we donate funds. Nowlin Elementary had the children draw thank you cards which were on display and Long Elementary, which just came on board this spring, is "super excited to have native plants in their garden".

A Lady Named Clara



"A Lady Named Clara – Clara Bryant Ford", excerpt (paraphrased) from a paper by Mrs. Lura M. Chiappetta and Mrs. Beulah Gainor, Garden Club of Dearborn, September 17, 1980, found in our Garden Club archives:

Clara was small boned with delicate features, small to medium height. Her hair was chestnut and her eyes were hazel. Being raised on a farm with two younger sisters and seven brothers, Clara was close to family life, was careful, thrifty, practical, believing firmly in God, church, the richness and bounty of the earth, and the dignity of labor. She loved music, dancing, literature and art.

She disliked the color bright red. Her favorite color was blue. Clara also disliked cats. Being a lover of birds, she felt cats a danger to them and was recorded as saying "Either put bells on them or else get rid of them". Her one vanity was her feet. A salesman at a shoe store said "she has very pretty feet and ankles and her husband, Henry Ford, likes her to wear dainty slippers. They dance together quite a lot, you know".

Clara Bryant was born on April 11, 1866 in the "Scotch Settlement" near Dearborn, Michigan. Her father was Melvin Bryant and her mother was Martha Bench from Warwickshire, England. Clara met Henry at her cousin Clarence's birthday party and later at socials held at Martindale House, the hostelry in Dearborn Village. His pet name for her was Callie. Henry was tall and remained thin throughout his life. His hair was fair and his eyes blue. Henry had an inquisitive and inventive mind and his value systems matched Clara's. He was the eldest of six children born to Mary Litogot and William Ford of Dearborn on July 30, 1963.

Clara and Henry were married on Clara's 22nd birthday – April 11, 1888 – at 6:00pm. Henry was 24 years of age. Clara made her own wedding dress. The wedding trip was spent at the tenant's cabin on the Moir place (previously part of the Ford farm). They lived there for over a year. (Editor's note: The first house they built together, referred to as "The Square House" was located at Ford Road and what is now Southfield Freeway. It was moved to 29835 Beechmont Avenue in Garden City in 1952 to make way for freeway expansion and was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1980).

Clara and Henry had many homes, the twelfth of which was Fair Lane, built of Indiana limestone and comprising 1,350 acres. Additionally, they had seasonal homes in a two-story gabled house adjoining Thomas Edison's property in Fort Myers, Florida, a plantation called "Richmond Hill" near Savannah, Georgia and a bungalow in Dearborn woods for seasonal outings. (Editor's note: This bungalow no longer exists but was located right near our meeting place, the First Presbyterian Church of Dearborn, and they could motor up the Rouge from their estate.)

The following recipes were taken verbatim from the minutes of the May 14, 1917 meeting of the Garden Club of Dearborn:

PARSNIPS: "Cook parsnips until they are tender, lay them in a dish and sprinkle as much cheese as you like, make a cream sauce and mix, put in the oven and bake about ten minutes, or the cheese may be put in the cream sauce".

PIE PLANT (rhubarb): "To cook pie plant wash it and leave peeling on when it is young, put in a sirup and put it in the oven and cook".
